Thank you to everyone who participated in the Nelson 2050 Vision Survey and visited with us at pop-ups. From an analysis of the public feedback collected, main themes were identified. Main themes were then consolidated into 4 Foundational Values. Advisory Committee Re-cap – Thursday November 30, 2023

The <u>project website</u> has been updated with the presentations from the last Advisory Committee meeting. This meeting featured a project update presentation and a presentation from the Housing Needs Assessment consultant <u>M'akola Development Services</u>. The Housing Needs Assessment is a <u>provincial requirement</u> for an OCP and M'akola presented on initial findings. The final report is anticipated to be completed in March 2024.

New Provincial Legislation

The government of BC has introduced Bills to update the Local Government Act. Bills 44, 46, 47 pertain to changes for residential development, development financing and transit-oriented areas. After adoption, a policy manual will be sent to municipalities with more detailed regulation changes which will impact our policy frameworks at the City of Nelson including the OCP and Zoning Bylaw. Small Housing BC collaborated on a video with About Here that explores how limitations on size, financial viability and extra rules are just some of the most cited reasons for the lack of missing middle housing from emerging. Uytae explores what BC can learn from other jurisdictions, and outline how pragmatic policy solutions such as introducing strata-titling can deliver more attainable housing.
